YEAR IN REVIEW



VERTICAL LANDFILL EXPANSION

The City of Melville constructed two new municipal landfill waste cells for the vertical expansion of the existing landfill. A design for six new cells was completed providing room for future expansion. Required infrastructure included landfill gas venting pipes, leachate collection system and leachate storage ponds were included along with defined disposal areas for metals, asphalt shingles, and concrete. A new entry to the landfill, including a new 80ft weigh scale and guardhouse building were also constructed.

By investing in the City of Melville's solid waste management future City Council has ensured that Melville has future growth opportunities by ensuring a viable and sustainable asset that offers an affordable service to the residents of Melville and the Parkland region.

SIDEWALK TRIP' HAZARDS REMOVAL



This year we focused on sidewalk trip hazard removal in residential areas on the West side of the city.

As part of the City's accessibility program, the City of Melville removed trip hazards on the sidewalks in Melville. This is the **8th year** the City of Melville has completed this work to ensure residents are safe.

The City of Melville hired SafeSidewalks Canada to eliminate the trip hazard by grinding the areas where the sidewalks lifted and are uneven causing the sidewalk to be unsafe.

PATHWAY RESURFACE PROJECT

The City of Melville 2024 Pathway Project includes:

- Pathway (Pool parking lot to Pool)
- · Pathway (Prince Edward Street to Park Boulevard)

Renewing walking pathways, especially those with broken asphalt, is crucial for the safety and wellbeing of pedestrians. Broken or uneven asphalt poses significant risks to those using the pathways, as it can lead to trips, falls, and injuries. By investing in the renewal of walking pathways, the City of Melville is prioritizing the safety of residents and visitors, creating a more secure environment for individuals of all ages while enhancing accessibility.



The total investment of this project was \$92,675.11



2024 MANHOLE RELINING PROJECT

DID YOU KNOW.....

The City of Melville has been relining manholes since 2003.

- There are 377 sanitary manholes within the City.
- To date 115 manholes have been relined.

This is truly a successful program that has resulted in 30% of the City's Sanitary Sewer manholes being rehabilitated. The City of Melville historically aims to reline approximately 6-8 manholes each year.

The process involves applying a durable and impermeable lining to the interior surfaces of manholes, effectively restoring structural integrity. The reconstruction of benching and walls, manhole relining mitigates the risks of soil erosion and collapse, ensuring the stability of the surrounding infrastructure. By reinforcing these essential structures, we're securing our community's infrastructure for generations to come.

This year we relined a total of 8 manholes utilizing CCBF funding.

The total investment this year was \$87,768.

UPGRADES TO LIFT STATION #3

The Lift Station #3 project consisted of a complete repiping of the dry cell. The total cost of the Lift Station #3 refurbishment was \$135,008.98.





The interior refurbishment of Lift Station #3 consisted of:

- The rebuilding of two pumps
- The installation of a new working platform
- the installation of a new ladder
- the installation of a new Fall Arrest system

The exterior refurbishment of Lift Station #3 consisted of:

- LED Lights
- Sidewalk
- Siding
- Generator Privacy Enclosure







In 2024, The City of Melville planted 83 trees

2024 REFORESTATION PROJECT

Reforestation holds significant importance as it contributes to the overall health, sustainability, and social well-being of urban environments. Trees play a crucial role in mitigating air pollution by absorbing pollutants such as carbon dioxide and releasing oxygen during photosynthesis. Strategic reforestation efforts can act as a natural filter, improving air quality and promoting the physical health and mental well-being of city residents. The presence of green spaces and tree-lined streets has been linked to reduced stress, improved mood, and enhanced overall quality of life.









WELCOME TO MELVILLE

We collaborated with Iron Town Manufacturing to create new signage that welcomes visitors to our community. Our aim was to incorporate the existing silhouette theme seen throughout the area and to use wooden frames for the signs, ensuring a cohesive and unified look.

The Recreation staff has constructed the frames and installed the signs at four different locations. Additionally, we plan to install solar lighting systems to illuminate the signs at night.




voice and a platform for input for our youth.

POTHOLE REPAIRS

The Public Works employees have worked to upkeep our City roads and repair as many potholes as they can. This year a lot of repair work was completed on 7th Ave, Manitoba Street and 3rd Ave. The employees worked a total of 2,194 hours upkeeping our roads in 2024.







OUTDOOR RINK REFURBISHMENT

The Outdoor Rinks received a much needed refurbishment this year. The Public Works employees have completed repainting all of the outdoor rinks and will continue getting them installed for the season.



GORDON KEETS PEACE MEMORIAL PARK FENCE

The Parks & Recreation staff removed the old rotted fence at the Gordon Keets Peace Memorial Park and replaced it with a new one. The Public Works employees then completed the project finalizing the ground work and turning it into a parking lot for the safety of the of all who come to enjoy the park.





FIRE HYDRANTS, FLOWER BARRELS & NEW TREES

The Parks & Recreation Summer Students spent their time with the City of Melville watering the community flower barrels around the down town core and watering the newly planted trees around the community. They also started the fire hydrant painting project with the Public Works employees completing it.







COLUMBARIUM

The City installed a 48 Niche Columbarium



The total cost of the new Columbarium was \$22,946.88.

The funds for this purchase came from capital reserves where a portion of each niche sale is allocated for future columbarium purchases.

QUEEN STREET CROSSWALK

The Public Works employees installed a crosswalk on Queen Street and Halifax Street to continue our commitment to resident safety.

SWIMMING POOL

The Melville Swimming Pool opened on Friday June 7th, 2024, the last day of pool use was Thursday August 22nd, 2024 which equaled 76 days of swimming for the season.

We had 18 lifeguards in total this year, 11 were returning and 7 were new to our facility.

We offered 7 different lesson sets options, one was a two week set where participants swam once a day for 2 weeks, there were two superset lessons where participants swim twice a day for 1 week and we also offered 2 accelerated supersets, were participants swam once a day for an extended time for only one week (choice of morning session or afternoon sessions). Registrations in the accelerated supersets were great and both participants and lifeguards were happy with the outcome and viability of running lessons in this way. We are planning to offer all accelerated supersets next season as we had a large waiting list of participants who were unable to get into the lesson set levels they required. By changing all of our offered swimming lesson sets as accelerated lessons we will gain 3 additional lesson sets. We had a total of 404 swimming lesson registrations this year.

We continued our collaboration with Little Black Bear Band, Okanese First Nation, PeePeekisis Cree Nation and Starblanket Cree Nation. With this collaboration we seen a combined total of approximately 373 of their members utilize the Melville Swimming Pool throughout the summer, that is an increase of 29.97% from 2023.

With 11 returning lifeguards this year we had a great number who were able to accommodate/work day time hours for the month of June in which we were able to accommodate 28 school swim times. Miller Elementary, Davison Elementary, Melville Comprehensive, St. Henry's Jr, St. Henry's Sr., St. Michaels School in Yorkton and Greyson School were all able to enjoy the pool to end their school year.

On Canada day we hosted a free swim from 1:00pm-6:00pm, we seen approximately 320 swimmers during that time.

We were host to a Water Polo Clinic put on by Water Polo Sask on August 9th, we had approximately 12 participants.

Aquacize was busy as per usual this year with a steady 10-15 each session.

We were able to accomodate 25 Birthday party/ private rentals this year!

PARK PROGRAM

The Summer Park Program has and continues to be a very well attended City provided program in our community thanks to the Community Initiatives Fund grant, we receive \$6000.00 from the grant that goes towards program leader wages and some craft supplies. The Park Program is a six week free program for children aged 6-12 years old, it runs Monday- Thursday from 9:30am-3:30pm. The program is based out of the Kinsmen Park but partakes in activities and events throughout the community like the swimming pool, other park locations, the museum, tennis courts, disc golf course and Regional Park.

In 2024 all 40 available slots were filled within 5 minutes of registrations opening, which was 75% faster than in 2023. We had an additional twenty participants on a waiting list that filled spots while other kids were away on holidays, the waiting list seen an increase of 33.33% from 2023.

Three leaders run the program and coordinate the daily activities throughout the 6 week program.

Activities include but are not limited to:

Daily crafts such as: puppet building, tye dying shirts, slime making, coffee filter butterflies, straw painting, popsicle stick bird feeders, landscape crafts, salt dough fossils and popsicle stick dragonflies.

Daily games such as: sandcastle building contests, scavenger hunts, kick ball, baseball, soccer, basketball, airplane competitions, nature walks, spray park fun, cops and robbers, glow day, pickleball and tennis, slushies' day, water balloon fights etc.

The leaders took the participants an quite a few excursions throughout the 6 weeks, they went on nature walks through the regional park and visited some local community businesses.

The Summer Park Program visited Lady Di's Healing Elements where they participated in a meditation session, and the Heritage Museum where they washed socks on an old wash board. The new Melville Taekwondo group provided the park program with a demonstration, information and a chance to try out some beginner moves!

Owen Parker with the hug a tree program came for an afternoon, he provided an informational session on what to do when you get lost and how he is part of a search and rescue team. The Park Program visited Matty's Family Fun Centre where they spent the afternoon playing games and cooled off with a cold treat. Ringette Saskatchewan came down and did a demonstration, skills session and finished the day off with a game of scrimmage. We had Melville Pharmasave provide cold treats for our program participants this year as well!


There were 60 total registrants for this years park program and on average we had 30-35 participants on a daily basis.




We are currently creating a dedicated sponsorship page on the City of Melville's website. This initiative presents significant benefits for both the City and the community.




